

Bio-note of Prof. Vinay Dharwadker

Prof. Vinay Dharwadker is Professor of English, World Literature, and South Asian Studies in the Department of English, University of Wisconsin–Madison, USA. His early publications include *The Oxford Anthology of Modern Indian Poetry* (edited with A. K. Ramanujan, 1994) as well as A. K. Ramanujan's *Collected Poems* (co-editor, 1995) and *Collected Essays* (general editor, 1999), all from Oxford University Press. Among his other books are *Cosmopolitan Geographies: New Locations in Literature and Culture* (editor; Routledge, 2001) and *Kabir: The Weaver's Songs* (translator; Penguin Classics, 2003). He served as the South Asia editor of *The Norton Anthology of World Literature*, 3rd edition, 6 volumes (2012; editorial consultant, 4th edition, 2018). His book-length translations include *Mohan Rakesh: One Day in the Season of Rain* (Hindi; co-translated with Aparna Dharwadker; Penguin, 2015), and *Kalidasa: Abhijnanashakuntalam, The Recognition of Shakuntala* (Sanskrit; Penguin, 2016). His scholarly essays have appeared in various collections on South Asia, postcolonialism, modernism, literary theory, translation studies, world literature, and cosmopolitanism; and in journals such as *Critical Inquiry* (1992), *Comparative Literature Studies* (2002), and *PMLA* (2012, 2016). He is a founding editor of the new *Oxford History of Poetry in English*, 13 volumes, and editor of its two volumes on Anglophone poetry other than British and American (forthcoming).
